Assessment of cognitive functions in Rheumatoid arthritis patients

Aim: The diagnosis of cognitive dysfunction in patients with Rheumatoid arthritis is often not noticed, regardless of their importance and frequency. The aim of this study was examination of cognitive functions in patients with Rheumatoid arthritis in relation to intensity of pain, duration of illness, degree of disease activity, anatomical and functional stage of disease.

Material: Study included 53 women with Rheumatoid arthritis (RA group with mean age 50.58±0.93 years and 27 women, healthy subjects (CO group) with mean age of 49.41±1.08 years.

Methods: Intensity of pain was determined using visual analogue scale (VAS), functional status was assessed using HAQ (Health Assessment Questionnaire), disease activity using the activity index disease (DAS 28), neurophysiological tests were done by usage P300 event-related potentials and cognitive status is evaluated by Wechsler scale-based memory (WMS).

Results: The average value of the amplitude of P300 potential and average values of the memory coefficient (WMS) were significantly lower in the RA group compared to the CO group.

Conclusion: The high frequency of cognitive dysfunctions in patients with Rheumatoid arthritis requires in time diagnosis and adequate treatment.
